“Death was no match for God!”

The ancient Greek essayist Plutarch told the story of a man he knew who attempted to make a dead body stand upright. He tried various schemes finally giving up in disgust saying, “There is something missing on the inside.” There certainly is. What is missing is the life God gives, and no one but God has ever found the secret of creating life. If God has given life once to us before we were born, what is to stop God from giving life once more, in other forms and other ways – after we are once dead?

The philosopher/mathematician, Blaise Pascal (1623-1662) put it this way: “What reason can people give for saying that we cannot rise again? Which is the more difficult – to be born, or to rise again? Is it more difficult to come into being than to return to it?”

“Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.” (Hebrews 11:1) *A Declaration of Faith* of The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) affirms our assurance of what we hope for and yet have not seen – yet.

In the death of Jesus Christ

God’s way in the world seemed finally defeated.

But death was no match for God.

The resurrection of Jesus was God’s victory over death.

We do not yet see the end of death,

But Christ has been raised from the dead,

transformed and yet the same person.


In his resurrection is the promise of ours . . .

So we treat death as a broken power . . .

I invite you to be a part of the worshipping community on Easter Sunday when I preach a sermon entitled *The House of Laughter*.

Did you know that Eugene O’Neill penned the play *Lazarus Laughed*? It is a play about Lazarus’ life after Jesus brought him back from the dead. His life is very controversial now – because he laughs at death. Even his home in Bethany has come to be called the “House of Laughter.”

I think that that would be a good name for a church – don’t you? First Presbyterian Church – The House of Laughter! Come and let us laugh together! Laugh, because “there is no death, really. There is only life! There is only God! There is only incredible joy!”

April 2nd: Sydney Kling - **People with AIDS in South Africa** - What Does It All Mean?

Sydney Kling is a nurse and former Peace Corps and Global Volunteer. She was previously in charge of the newborn genetic screening program at the Illinois Department of Public Health.

April 9th: Professor Baker Siddiquee, UIS - **Fundamentalism around the World**, with special attention to the Muslim world.

Baker Siddiquee is a professor of economics and longtime student of world religions. He is a Muslim and hails originally from Bangladesh and travels there frequently. He is a most thoughtful Interpreter. He has visited us several times before.

April 23rd: Fesseha Teklahaimanot, Engineer at the Illinois Department of Transportation - **Christianity in Ethiopia Today.**

Our own Fesseha returned recently from a seven-week visit to his home in Ethiopia. His father was a pastor in the Ethiopian Orthodox Christian Church. Fesseha is most knowledgeable on current trends in the church and in his country.

April 30th: Professor Jan Droegkamp, UIS - **Jamaica Today.**

Where is Jamaica in development and democracy and living standards today? She takes students to Jamaica on work trips, and not to the beaches. Barbara Olson has gone on a trip with her. How little we know of our close neighbors such as the Jamaicans!

First Presbyterian Church (FPC) has contracted with the Springfield Association for Retarded Citizens (SPARC) for certain cleaning and janitorial services. As you know, SPARC is a not-for-profit social service agency which has served developmentally disabled citizens for over 40 years. SPARC is the local affiliate of the National Association for Retarded Citizens.

Our partnership agreement provides that SPARC will be responsible for all costs associated with the employment of individuals to perform the services and that FPC will have no responsibility or liability for any employees of SPARC. The fee for services rendered is quite cost-effective for FPC.

Billy Rivers, Program Manager for SPARC, and his associate Dennis Mayberry worked with Tom Melton, Cindy Cass, Mike Self and others to plan for the work that began on March 3. The original idea came from the pastor, Clifford J. Hayes. Thanks to the Building & Grounds Committee and the Personnel Committee for their participation and support.

If you have occasion to interface with any of the SPARC clients or supervisors who will be using this experience to develop their skills and keep our premises in top shape, please speak and get acquainted. Although initially the crew will be on premises almost exclusively on Friday evening, personal relationships and interface can be an important part of the program also. Let's welcome them warmly.

Children taste eggs and matzah as Christi Parsons leads them in the Passover meal.

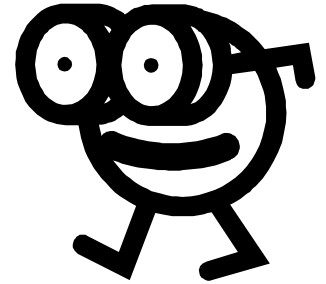

Creamy vs. Crunchy

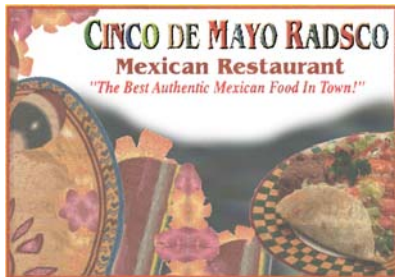
Well, it's primary election time and the Deacons have a challenge – **PEANUT BUTTER**.

Jim Andrews dies in traffic accident

Longtime stated clerk helped bring about Presbyterian reunion

LOUISVILLE - The Rev. James E. Andrews, who served as stated clerk of the General Assembly for 23 years, was struck and killed by a car on March 7 while walking near his Decatur, GA, home. He was 77.

Andrews was elected General Assembly stated clerk of the former Presbyterian Church in the United States (PCUS) in 1973. He served for one year as co-interim stated clerk with his United Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) counterpart, William P. Thompson, following Presbyterian reunion in 1983. The next year, he was elected stated clerk of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), a position he held until his retirement in 1996.

"Jim was passionately dedicated to the church," his widow, Elizabeth, told the Presbyterian News Service. "He'd probably say his crowning achievement was helping to bring about reunion."

"He was one of the primary architects for the 1983 reunion of our two former denominations," Kirkpatrick said. "He expressed and lived out a passion for civil rights. He lifted up the importance of our involvement in ecumenism."

John Detterick, executive director of the General Assembly Council, said "Jim Andrews was not only a forceful leader of this church, but for me was a gentle and wise mentor."

But Andrews could also be stubborn, recalled former Presbyterian News Service director Marj Carpenter. "We were going to Cuba, and Jim was taking some medicine for a child that could not be obtained in Cuba," she said. "They arrested him at the Havana airport for smuggling drugs. He explained what it was and then pulled up a chair and announced, 'I'm sitting here until I get that kid's medicine back.'" Carpenter said a doctor was called in, examined and approved the medication, whereupon it was returned to Andrews. "They REALLY didn't want Jim Andrews sitting in the Havana airport for God knows how long," Carpenter laughed.

Andrews was also a notorious non-morning person, Carpenter said. "When we'd be getting ready for General Assembly," she mused, "he'd say, 'Don't put me down to speak at any breakfasts; neither God nor the Holy Spirit comes to breakfast.'"

Besides his wife, Andrews is survived by two children and four grandsons. His first wife, Patricia Bullock, died in 1959. Services were held on Sunday, March 12, at Oakhurst Presbyterian Church in Decatur.
