Hidden in Plain Sight

A brother and sister received an urgent telegram from their minister telling them that a relative had died and had left them some valuable property. They were to contact their minister for details. Excited they immediately rushed to the church whereupon the pastor informed them that the relative was Moses and the valuable property was the Judea-Christian tradition. Disappointed that their legacy was not real estate they turned aside from the gift.

It is and has always been difficult to separate that which has true value from that which is temporary. It is difficult, because the world is so noisy. The world – no, Springfield is filled with distractions. To complicate matters – we are dazzled by power, success, and beauty. And yet we keep looking and searching, because we know that deep within us there is a great need; deep within us is a spiritual longing.

We try to fill this vacuum . . . by immersing ourselves in our work, hoping that this will satisfy us . . . by focusing on the family, feeling that somehow this must be our first concern.

A story may be instructive here.

The members of a certain West African tribe tell the legend of the Sky Maiden. It happened once that the people of the tribe noticed their cows were giving less milk than usual. They could not understand why. One young man volunteered to stay up all night to see what might be happening. After several hours of waiting in the darkness, hiding in a bush, he saw something quite extraordinary. A young woman of astonishing beauty rode a moonbeam down from heaven to earth, carrying a large pail. She milked the cows, filled her pail, and rode the moon beam up into the sky. The man could not believe what he had seen. The next night he set a trap. When the maiden came down to milk the cows, he sprang the trap and caught her. “Who are you?” he demanded.

She explained that she was a Sky Maiden, a member of a tribe that lived in the sky and had no food of their own. It was her job to come to earth and find food. She pleaded with him to let her out of the net. She would do anything he asked. The man said he would release her only if she agreed to marry him. “I will marry you,” she said, “but first you must let me go home for three days to prepare myself. Then I will return and be your wife.” He agreed.

Three days later she returned, carrying a large box. “I will be your wife and make you very happy,” she told him, “but you must promise me never to look inside this box.”


For some time they were very happy together. Then one day while his wife was out, the man was overcome with curiosity and opened the box. There was nothing in it. When the woman came back, she saw her husband looking strangely at her and said, “You looked in the box, didn’t you? I cannot live with you any more.”

“Why?” the man asked. “What’s so terrible about my seeing an empty box?”

“I’m not leaving you because you opened the box,” she said. “I thought you probably would. I’m leaving you because you said it was empty. It was not empty. It was full of sky. It contains the light and the air and the smells of my home in the sky. When I went home for the last time, I filled that box with everything that was most precious to me to remind me of where I came from. How can I be your wife if what is most precious to me is emptiness to you?”

What is important to us, indeed what is urgent and vital is right before our eyes. We breathe it in all of the time. Its sight to us is quite usual. It is the revelation that has come to us from God, in Jesus Christ. It is as common to us as the church on the street corner – Presbyterian, Lutheran, Episcopal, Methodist, Baptist, Disciples – and these are only the churches within a two block area. How much more ordinary can you get than that?

On Pentecost the church of Jesus Christ was born. It is your inheritance. God invites you to treasure it the way God treasures you.

Notes from the Food Pantry

Since there was no report from the pantry last month, this will catch you up on what is happening in the food pantry. In March the pantry served 261 adults, 124 children, 153 sack lunches and received 355 food items plus monetary donations!

In April the food pantry served 297 adults, 139 children, and 187 sack lunches. We received 162 items from congregation donations on April. Thank you for your continued support and please don't forget the pantry over the summer. Schools out and that means an increased demand on the pantry.

HABITAT HIGHLIGHTS

Since 1994, First Presbyterian Church has joined eleven partnerships to build Habitat for Humanity homes through Habitat for Humanity of Sangamon County (“... *thy kingdom come, on earth, as it is in heaven.* . . .”) where low income families purchase homes with no interest mortgages (“... *forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors.* . . .”). Three years ago, our church joined with many youth groups in the area (“*Our father, who art in heaven.* . . .”) to sponsor the first all youth build, involving young people, ages 5 to 25, in both the planning and the construction of a Habitat home.

Last year, a deeply dedicated group of young people planned and built their third beautiful home in the Habitat for Humanity subdivision off of Park Street. Young people built the first, seventh, and final home in this subdivision, which now houses eleven families. This year, young people will be building another three-bedroom home with Michelle Bates and her seven-year-old son Colton. Many area colleges, high schools, junior high schools, and churches are represented on these builds.

A record number of youth from First Church have volunteered to fill leadership roles this year including Bennett Stephens who is serving as a Co-coordinator of the Construction Committee, Lillie Anderson and Tanisha Force who are serving as Co-coordinators of the Food Committee (adult church members can expect to hear from them for help with food), and Emma Frederick who is serving as Coordinator of the Kids Program Committee.

Many adults with ties to First Church have also volunteered over the years to help nurture the young people on these builds. Adults involved in the build this year include Mary Beth Stephens, Duane Slater, Tim Koschmann, Greg Krutsinger, Terry Finney, Jim Enlow, and Don Ecklund. Of course, many many more church members continue to serve in the extremely important supportive roles in Habitat builds such as providing delicious food for the volunteers (“... *give us this day our daily bread.* . . .”).

Anyone interested in volunteering for the construction phase of the build, which takes place between July 26 and November 11, is encouraged to pick up a volunteer form at church. After the first two blitz weekends (Friday and Saturday), the rest of the work on this home will be completed on Saturdays. The Kickoff of the build will be Thursday, July 26, 7:00 p.m., Springfield Church of Christ and the Dedication and Shower will be Sunday, November 11, 2:00 p.m., at the newly finished home in Grandview (2230 E Enterprise St.). Anyone interested in getting involved in the planning phase of the build or wishing further information should contact Don Ecklund (787-7810).

U-2 Can Make Swedish Meatballs

Ingredients

2 lbs ground beef (not lean)
1 lb ground pork
½ cup finely chopped onion
4 slices of bread (not too dense)
1 T salt
2 eggs
½ t pepper
1 T sugar
½ t allspice
enough milk to dissolve bread

Directions

Cut bread in cubes and soak in milk (use a fork and stir hard until the bread pieces turn to mush).

Add the rest of the ingredients and mix thoroughly (I use my hands) until they are thoroughly mixed. Form small balls (about 1” in diameter) and brown in a skillet (medium heat seems to work best) on all sides using a little olive oil initially so the first ones do not stick to the pan. They flatten out some and need browning on about three sides. Remove to a baking dish as they finish browning. After browning is complete, add a small amount of water to the drippings in the skillet, boil, and then pour over the meatballs.

Bake at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes with cover on baking dish.

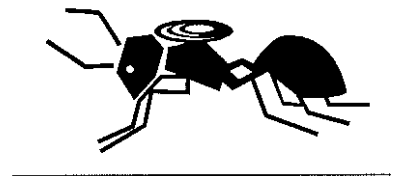
